More Thoughts on Being Mobile Or Murphy's Law for Hams

In a couple of previous articles for the Roadrunner I gave some thoughts about being a mobile station. One article told of installing rigs and antennas and the importance of proper grounds while a second article gave some hints on proper operating procedure. It seemed to be time to add some additional thoughts and also to offer my version of Murphy's Law for mobiles.

The most important lesson is one I learned the hard way. For those of you who may have wondered where I disappeared to after being a pretty regular check in – here's why. My rig blew up. The trusty old Alinco DX70 seemed all of a sudden to have lost its ability to hear anything. On investigation I discovered that the audio board had been fried. How? Well read on, OM, and see what happens when you just plain mess up.

I had trouble with the pickup suddenly deciding that it didn't want to run. Now, if this happens to you in New York you can probably tie a message to a rock and throw it to the nearest garage. Unfortunately this does not hold true in southern Utah. When I finally managed to get back to town from Zion National Park, 55 miles, the prudent thing to do was to take the truck to the nearest (read only) GM dealer. Little did I know what I was in for. They found the problem right away – a bad control module in the injector pump on the diesel. They even fixed it right away.

What they didn't do (apparently) was to disconnect all the battery cables before installing the new module. No big deal – it works – right?

Wrong. Somehow in someway the process of installing the new module sent a spurt of energy through all the lines. Result – one fried receiver on the HF rig and one shorted mike on the VHF rig. Both of these had fuses in both positive and negative lines but the fuses didn't blow. It sounds like I could file a claim with the dealer for repairs to the radios but I can't prove it so no claim.

The lesson to be learned from this is simple. Any time you take your vehicle in for repairs disconnect all radio leads (including the antenna) from the vehicle. Don't rely on the dealer or mechanic to do it himself or even if he does make he effort to do it correctly. It is simple to do, easy to reconnect and certainly safer. In fact, if you are like most hams you probably rushed the installation in the first place in order to get on the air and now have a chance to shorten wires, clean contacts, etc. Believe me; it is easier than repairing the rig(s). Mine has now been in the shop for eighteen weeks with no end in sight.

Here are some other observations made while operating mobile that I am sure most of us can relate to. These observations I call Murphy's laws for mobiles.

- 1. Your signal strength (or his) will drop to zero just about the time you make contact.
- 2. It will jump back up as soon as the mobile moves on to someone else.
- 3. You will pick up the wrong mike just when the 2nd District of Alaska comes on.
- 4. You will not know it is the wrong mike until the end of the run.
- 5. When you do get the right mike see #1.
- 6. Your XYL, navigator, whatever will start telling you about something on the side of the road right in the middle of a last county contact.
- 7. Her/his comment will be just loud enough that you miss the signal report.
- 8. When someone puts out a county you have been looking for for over a year that is when you will be in the diner eating.
- 9. Your antenna will need adjusting only when it is pouring rain.
- 10. When you do adjust it you will do so in the wrong direction and have to get out in the rain and do it over.
- 11. You should not transmit while pumping gas. Unfortunately that is just when the one you need is running.
- 12. You can hear the net control, net control can hear the mobile, and the mobile can hear you. None of you can hear each other. (*continued on page 5*)

- 13. At the time you are in the middle of a contact you have a law officer leaning in and telling you that in ?? (read your state) it is illegal to use a cell phone while mobile. By the time you explain ham radio to him the contact has long gone.
 - 14. When you are in the open and the band is good there will be nothing on that you need.
 - 15. When a county you need desperately is being run you will be at the bottom of a canyon in a thunderstorm.
 - 16. After you have managed to successfully cope with all of the above the band will die.

All of the above are corollaries to Murphy's Law. For those who might not be familiar with it here it is:

Murphy's Law #1 – Whatever can go wrong will.

Murphy's Law #2 – Whatever has gone wrong will get worse.

Murphy's Law #3 – When it seems as though nothing is wrong for cripes sake PANIC!

Obviously some of the above is in jest. However, I hope you will take to heart what I said about vehicle repairs. The cost of repairs can often times rival the cost of the rig. It just isn't worth it. 73 and happy mobiling.

More CW Tips

Hey have you been watching those needed counties being posted on the MRIC on CW and thinking to yourself I'd sure like to work those counties. Well it's really not that hard. You already have a major part done by knowing the mobile's call and county/ies. With just a little work and little effort on your part you could be get them.

First, you will have to have something to send the code with like a straight key or iambic keyer. These are really not that expensive when bought at places like hamfest flea markets. In the past I have bought old useable straight keys for less then 5 bucks and Iambic key paddles with cable & plugs for \$ 25 - 30 bucks at hamfest. True, the old straight key wasn't much, but worked fine. I recently bought a like-new MFJ-564 Iambic key paddle (a MFJ copy of the Bencher Iambic key) with cable & plug for 30 bucks. I have even bought a couple older model Iambic key for 20 bucks with no name tag on them. I used one of them for well over a year while running mobile. I recently moved up to a Vibroplex Code Warrior Jr. You can get a basic Ameco model K-1 straight-key for about 10 bucks new and you can buy or make your own cable from the key or keyer to the radio.

Yes, you got to know how to send and receive some code like your call, reports like: 229 or 22N, 339 or 33N, 449 or 44N, 559 or 55N, 599 or 5NN, and a few things like QRZ (who is calling), QRV (waiting for a call), (RST) signal report or when sent by a relay station with your call means send your signal report to the mobile), AGN (again), QRS (send slower), ? (question), QSP (relay), (who needs a relay), and ALSO (often used in replying like {ALSO 5NN} to start with. You can use a program like CWGET to help with the receive, but its no where near 100 percent copy and you will need an audio cable between the remote speaker and the computer and normally requires some minor adjustment on the computer's sound card adjustments and the rig so as not to overload the computer's sound card. In a way CWGET is a nice way to watch and learn the CW net operating procedures. MJF makes a small code copy unit (MFJ-461 about \$80 bucks new) that doesn't require any connection to the radio, but like CWGET not a 100 percent copy. Both CWGET and the MFJ-461 will require some adjustment of the radio audio and of course they both do a fairly good job of copying decent sent CW. Remember the normal speed on the CW net is somewhere at or about 15 WPM, but mobile and net-controller will slow down their speed or spacing normally when sending your call and report (RST).

My First Road Trip as a County Hunter

Let me start by saying it is all Bobs' (N4CD) fault. I was perfectly content working contests and picking up a few new DXCC countries from time to time. I even went on several Dxpeditions, V31, TI2, TI5 & TI9, so that I could have the opportunity to BE the "wanted DX" station rather than "just another K7 station" trying to break the pile up. It was easy to copy the report since everyone was a 59 or 599 no matter how many time they had to repeat their call sign.

I first met Bob during our trip to TI9M, Cocos Island. We had plenty of time on the boat going and returning to talk about other aspects of ham radio besides DXing. I had been warned prior to our departure that Bob was a "little bit different", he is "one of those County Hunters". I didn't know anything about County Hunting so I did not take the warning seriously, though perhaps I should have.

In mid April this year I was tuning around the band looking for new countries when I stumbled upon 14.336. Still had no clue what I was about to get myself into. I listened for several days never thinking that I would become addicted to County Hunting. After checking around the Internet for info on county hunting I finally worked up the courage to jump in with both feet. I pulled out all the QSL cards I had received over the past 10 years and started sorting out Counties.

I had not checked into a structured net since my MARS days. Had a couple of "bumps" right off the bat with one of the Net Controls (who shall remain nameless) but we quickly got those problems sorted out.

So I started logging Counties. Some days they came loud, many, and quickly & some days not so. When K8AO sent me my "first ever" 22 signal report I about died. No one had EVER given me a 22 signal report. I wasn't even mobile, I was at the house with my "monster" A3S beam 28 feet in the air. I soon learned that this is one of the few occasions where true & accurate reports are exchanged instead of the standard 599. I have received many 22's since. I just couldn't bring myself to give out any 22's though there were a bunch of 33's in the beginning until one day I worked a really truly 22. My apologies to Don K3IMC, he received the first 22 report that I ever sent.

The XYL and I had planned a trip from Kansas City, MO up to Minot, ND to visit our son and his wife & I got the hair brained idea that I could BE the wanted CH mobile. Not having done any mobile operating since my 27 Mhz days, I scrambled to find mobile HF antenna info. Found a "good deal" on a used Hustler mast & and some resonators, even had to borrow a mag mount to put them on, a big Thank You goes to Mac, W0ROO for the use of the mag mount.

I had been swapping E-Mails with Mr. "30 Meter" County Hunter, aka N4CD, he suggested I consider adding the 30M resonator to the 20 & 40 set up I was originally planning. I figured I would have my hands full with just 20 & 40 CW and SSB but did as he suggested. Better to have it & not need than wish that I had not left it at the house. After having received numerous helpful tips & hints from the guys in the chat room I began to believe that I could pull this off.

With road atlas in hand, I started making a list of which counties we would be passing through during our travels. Let's just say that the XYL was not excited the first time I tried to explain the CH mentality to her. Had the trip all planned out, had everything I thought I would need & started packing radio gear. My XYL commented that it looked like I was packing for another Dxpedition. We had learned from previous travels that if you didn't take it with you, you have to learn to "field improvise". Not quite so bad here stateside, there are actually Walmarts and Radio Shacks in nearly every city.

I started the day of our planned departure with several poor assumptions:

- 1) I assumed that the mini van would be available at the time requested, I had confirmed the day prior.
- 2) I assumed that the rental vehicle would be reasonably RF quiet, after all it was brand new.
- 3) I assumed that the 110V inverter I purchased would be RF quiet, I know better now.

Since the rental vehicle was not ready at the time requested the departure time was pushed several hours. When the XYL asked if I was ready, I said everything is in the van. She understood me to say I was ready to go, when what I meant was all the stuff was IN the van. She takes off down the road & I am scrambling around the back seat looking for cables, getting the radio, computer, tape recorder etc. hooked up and ready to run counties. I knew I had everything I needed IN the vehicle just a matter of finding it.

The first county line I knew was a "wet" line so I worked both sides of the line without bothering the driver to stop. Several county lines later I was starting to get the hang of this mobile operating & was ready to work some CW. I told my XYL what a fine job she was doing driving & that there was a county line coming up. What she didn't understand (or I didn't explain well the first time) was that I wanted her to STOP at the county line sign. When she stopped we were 20 feet past the sign, so she backed up carefully on the shoulder until the front & rear wheels were sitting in different counties. She was NOT excited about sitting on the side of the road, but dealt with it.

She was doing so well, that is until the flashing lights showed up in the rear view mirror. I told her to say to the officer "Ham Radio Operator and County Hunter". The officer apparently was aware of the bizarre behavior of CH'ers. After the officer left I apologized to her for not telling her that this type of encounter could possibly happen, then she got really mad cause I KNEW about the possibility of an encounter with Law Enforcement and I didn't tell her before hand, then off to the next county. She didn't want to stop on the CL's anymore after that. I assured her that it surely wouldn't happen more than once in the same day. Could I be wrong again? YEP. The remainder of the trip was rather uneventful. Conditions on the way up were not great because of the recent Flare activity, but the trip back was much better.

"Things I learned during this trip"

Operating from the house, with my short beam & ground mounted Vertical is MUCH different than running mobile. Having an 8 foot table in the shack to spread out on is much different than setting up in the back seat of a moving vehicle. Sending CW with a keyer sitting on a table is just not the same as having the key sitting on my left leg, being held in place with my left elbow, a note book in my left hand, holding pen in right hand and sending CW & hoping that the clip-on lapel mic is picking up everything except road noise.

Traveling with a mobile antenna that stands 13 feet 4 inches (Mag mount on the roof with the 54" hustler mast with 20, 30, & 40M resonators makes for very interesting times deciding which drive-thru McDonalds you want to take a chance on. Having never before operated on 30 meters that was a new experience. There were times that 30 was the only band that I could round up any activity. I knew that just about every time I CQ'd on 30 meters, N4CD would be one of the first one or two that I would hear come back. Next time I will take my foot switch along so I can use the boom mike, instead of having one more thing in my hand to wrestle with. Finally, traveling with a "family purpose" is very different than traveling for the expressed purpose of running counties

I have a much greater appreciation now for those who operate mobile, now that I have had the opportunity to "walk a mile in their shoes". Many thanks to all who encouraged me in this first endeavor & also thanks to those who didn't mind my asking AGN AGN on CW. It is a totally different listening environment also. Lots of other noises that I had to learn to ignore. I made nearly as many contacts on 30 CW as I did on 20 CW. 30 SSB was very quiet & I wasn't sure if it was supposed to be USB or LSB so I didn't run any there.

Why the electric companies would choose to run their power distribution lines right along side a roadway is one of those great mysteries. Do they not understand that mobile operators will be driving along these same roads & do not necessarily need all the extra background noise, thank you very much. Some areas of rural Kansas the noise levels were EXTREME.

I would be remiss if I did not extend a special Thank You to Kathy for driving the entire 2106 miles up and back just so I could sit in the back and play radio. She is beginning to warm to the idea of me becoming a mobile County Hunter. I haven't got her convinced to let me put an antenna on her car yet, but working on it. She said something about we looked like a bunch of hillbilly's running around with a huge antenna on the roof. I explained that the other people were not staring a us, they were admiring the fine job I did of running the ropes in four directions to help keep the tall mast upright, besides traveling in other states we likely wouldn't run into anyone we knew.

The question which begs to be answered - Would I EVER consider doing something like this again? Sure, I am just Krazy enough to think that I might enjoy another road trip, though I might decide to leave the family at home next time & take a ham buddy with me instead.

JUST TO LET EVERYONE KNOW I'M STILL ALIVE AND KICKING—I THINK.

Well, it's been awhile since I wrote something for the Roadrunner. Bet you all thought I'd gone away and it would be quiet for awhile—ha ha!
