



THE COUNTY LINE **ROADRUNNER**

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Riding the County Lion **Dave – KE3VV**

After spending far too much time watching the hopefully well-compensated Weather Channel reporters standing up to their ankles-knees-thighs in drifting snow during the Blizzard of 2016 that dumped more than two feet of snow on my house in DC, I must admit to a certain amount of gloating and an almost equal amount of empathy. This is my first winter totally away from the harsh reality of life in the Northeast, and I can't say that I miss it one iota. Can't go back now anyway. I gave my trusty Husqvarna snow blower to my Executive Assistant (who lives in snowy Hagerstown up by the Mason-Dixon Line) and loaded the Big Green Dragon and the County Lion into the truck and onto the AutoTrain and headed south in early January. Never looked back.

Certainly the highlight of my non-snowbound January had to be the Special Meeting of the Board of Directors of MARAC last week. "Why was it a 'Special' meeting?" inquired the ever inquisitive County Lion. Well, I explained, that is a parliamentary term applied to all corporate board meetings except the annual meeting. The MARAC annual meeting is held once a year in July along with the annual MARAC convention. He just shook his mane and went back to trying to get the Big Green Dragon to turn down the fire to a more Floridian belch. If you are a bit curious about what happens at a "Special" meeting, or at least this one we held last week, here is a brief synopsis. . .

I called the meeting to order at 0000 Z on January 27, 2016 and a quick roll call revealed that all members of the Board of Directors were present.

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The first three items were routine housekeeping matters - approval of the minutes of the September 11, 2015 Meeting; approval of the Treasurer's Reports for the months of August, September, October, and November 2015; and approval of the Awards Manager's report for November 2015.

Two items arose under the heading of Old Business. The first was a report by N5MLP on the status of the new MARAC-sponsored nets. At present, the only net is a 20 meter SSB net that meets on occasion. As with any new enterprise, the growing pains are mostly associated with needing more volunteers for NCS duty and needing more mobiles to run different counties. The latter is a perennial challenge, especially in the winter, but with gas prices getting lower every day and better weather in a month or two, there is hope for more activity. The other second item was a report and motion by W4SIG on the change in dates and venue for the 2016 MARAC National Convention from the previously announced July dates to August 1 through 4 at the Hyatt Place hotel in Germantown, TN, which received unanimous Board approval. More on the Convention will be in each issue of the Roadrunner, and Kerry has promised to work with the MARAC webmaster to get some information posted on the MARAC web site. On a personal note, I informed the Board that I will not be able to attend the 2016 Convention due to the change in dates. I already have a long-standing family commitment at the beginning of August that will have me languishing on Figure 8 Island in North Carolina in a far too expensive rental beach house. Oh well, maybe I can run some of those elusive Outer Banks counties. I plan to call for the regular Annual Meeting of the Board in July so that I can turn the reins of MARAC over to the next President after the results of the May election are announced (my second and final term as your President ends with the adjournment of the Annual Meeting). The line of succession forms now, and there is more information about the upcoming election as you page through the Roadrunner.

Back to the Board Meeting... and New Business.

The Board took up and passed a motion for MARAC to sponsor 2016 MARAC County Hunter CW and SSB contests. Greg (NM2L) has volunteered to be the Contest Coordinator and was appointed to that position. He will now appoint managers for each (CW and SSB) contest and will work with the MARAC webmaster to add a contest menu option and information to the MARAC website.

Next the Board adopted a motion by WQ7A to appoint a committee to investigate, negotiate with, and recommend to the Board a third-party election administration company to conduct and certify the validity of MARAC Board director and officer elections and membership ratification of Bylaw changes beginning with the 2016 MARAC elections and referendum to be held in May 2016. The committee will include W8JJ, N0KV, and W4SIG.

The Board then took up and passed several proposed changes to the MARAC Bylaws. The first was a motion to change Section 1.3(c) of the Bylaws regarding scheduling of board meetings to specify a time frame of 30 days within which the MARAC President must call a special meeting if any combination of five directors or officers request a special meeting. The Board also adopted a motion by W4SIG to clarify the intent of Section 4.1(e) of the MARAC Bylaws regarding MARAC Family Membership to add specific language requiring that Family Members must hold an amateur radio license. All changes to the MARAC Bylaws require ratification by the membership, so these changes will be on the ballot along with the election of officers and some of the directors in May.

The Awards Manager put forward several recommendations from the Awards Committee that were all unanimously approved by the Board. The first was a recommendation to modify the award rules for the Ran All (State) Counties Award to clarify that all segments of the award including Ran All USA Counties may be earned multiple times, as well as when the official list of USA Counties applies to each State Award and the Ran All USA Counties portion of the award. That was followed by Board approval of a recommendation to modify the award rules for the Double Diamond Award to clarify that contacts for the award do not have to be made between two mobile operators. The special requirement for at least 500 contacts to be made by the applicant while mobile in different counties on multiple bands only applies to the applicant for those contacts.

The final action by the Board was approval of a motion by N1API to authorize the Treasurer to reimburse the 2016 Convention Chairman up to \$2000 for major convention prizes for the 2016 Annual Convention. In addition the \$4000 in seed money provided for the Convention each year, this should allow for some substantial incentives for traveling to Memphis to have a chance to win some pretty fabulous prizes, as well as engage in a lot of fun activities and eyeball QSOs with the gang.

After adjournment, I opened the floor to questions and comments from the membership (and there were quite a few on the teleconference and in the chat room), but after an hour-long Board meeting, the chat session was brief and we all retired to our evening chores and relaxation.

Both the County Lion and the Big Green Dragon woke up briefly when the adjournment gavel sounded the end of the meeting, but soon continued their soporific sojourn through snooze city. I joined them shortly afterward after a brief stroll in the cool Florida evening sans snow, ice (other than a single cube in the single malt), and heavy jacket. 73, and Happy Valentine's Day to All!



Dateline CW

There are many paths that lead to a mobile county hunter's destination.

Boy the weather outside has been colder than a whaler's harpoon. I am in the radio shack with a nearby space heater that very seldom cycles. The radio is quiet; I have heard no mobiles calling on a frigid 20-meter CW frequency. I am paging through my QST magazine and I hear the barking of Gator's 4 x 4 as he approaches and slides to a stop at the recycled railroad tie. Gator opens the shack door and comes in carrying the familiar white cardboard container. "Greetings, Dude, I have some hot lattes to warm your frosty innards and stopped at the bakery for some fresh baked éclairs." I get a latte and a éclair, I lean back in my chair. This happening gives new meaning to crossing the border. There are 33 contests for the CW operator. To name a few, the YURL YL-ON contest, the British Columbia QSO party, the North America CW sprint, the UBA CW DX contest and of course the ARRL International CW DX contest. If you are reading this and are a sideband operator try the 10:10 International Winter sideband contest. I am getting old; I no longer buy green bananas because it is too risky of an investment. Featured Documentation Excerpt for February, 2016

This month the featured documentation excerpt from the Marac Net Documentation on our club website is section 2.6 of the net policy document "Marac Policy for Sponsored Net Operation" (POL-NET-001) which reads as follows:

2.6 Marac Sponsored Net Operation Expectations

Sponsored net operation expectations are as follows:

1. All amateur radio operators (who follow FCC rules and identify properly) shall be welcome and treated fairly, equally, and with respect.
2. All services provided on the net, such as running counties from a mobile, tutoring, relaying, etc. shall be equally available to all licensed radio amateurs.
3. Net control operations shall be shared equitably.

4. All participants shall conduct themselves in such a manner as to support all other participants to achieve their county hunting objectives in a friendly, cordial, supportive, and productive atmosphere.
5. During periods when mobiles are not running, less formal activities (such as brief exchanges between members, requests to call another participant to complete a contact, requests to move a mobile to another frequency for a separate exchange, etc.) shall be allowed so long as breaks are given to recognize anyone ready to run.
6. Mobile operators who are ready to run a county shall always be given priority over a fixed station running a county.
7. During periods of inactivity on the net, the net control operators may provide information about:
 - a. MARAC,
 - b. operations on a MARAC directed net,
 - c. where to find out more information about county hunting on the MARAC or other websites,
 - d. specifics about various MARAC awards and the requirements to attain those awards,
 - e. health and welfare updates on members,
 - f. upcoming mobile trips which have been posted by members or non-members,
 - g. upcoming regional or national MARAC conventions, and
 - h. other relevant information.
8. The MARAC net control award shall be associated with net control operations on MARAC sponsored nets only.

Prior winners (per mode) are not eligible to receive this award a second time. Please read the requirements for County Hunter of the Year and support those members who work to make MARAC the vibrant organization that it is.

Second Request

Nominations are currently open for the positions of President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer (all 2 year terms). Nominations are also open for the following Directorships: Northeast Director – 3 year term expiring 2019 and Pacific Director- 3 year term expiring 2019.

Nominations will be open for 60 days - from January 5th through March 10th. Nominations must be received and affirmed by the nominee by no later than March 10, 2016. Any current member of MARAC is eligible to run for office. For the District Director position, you must live within the District which is listed on the MARAC website.



□ Beale Street



All music lovers as well as those just looking for a fun night out on the town will not want to pass up an opportunity to visit Beale Street. This 1.8 mi (2.9 km) stretch of restaurants, bars, and clubs is more than just a place to get a bite to eat. It is now considered "The Official Home of the Blues."

From 1920 to 1940, artists descended on Beale Street and began to collaborate with one another, creating a new music style that blended smooth jazz with hard charging rock 'n' roll. This blend eventually gave birth to the blues, a new and distinctly American genre of music that gradually made its way into the American pop culture mainstream.

A visit to Beale Street today allows you to check out the blues clubs that served as the launching sites for some of the most famous American blues musicians of all time

□ Mud Island River Park



The Riverwalk is an exact scale model of the Lower Mississippi River flowing from its confluence with the Ohio River at Cairo, Illinois 954 miles south to the Gulf of Mexico. It features twenty cities that are mapped along the Riverwalk. Concrete wedges locate the main rivers flowing into the Mississippi or show river engineering structures such as floodways. There are four watershed walls which map the entire drainage area of the Mississippi River. The model empties into an acre size Gulf of Mexico. The park is designed using Corps of Engineers survey and navigational charts.

☐ Brooks Museum of Art



This museum houses an eclectic art collection from early Greek to modern. Brooks Museum is set in a beautiful park like setting. Every Wednesday is no admission charge


☐ Blues Hall of Fame



The Blues Hall of Fame honors those who have made the Blues timeless through performance, documentation, and recording. Since its inception in 1980, The Blues Foundation has inducted new members annually into the Blues Hall of Fame for their historical contribution, impact and overall influence on the Blues. Members are inducted into the Blues Hall of Fame in five categories: Performers, Individuals, Classic of Blues Literature, Classic of Blues Recording (Song), Classic of Blues Recording (Album). Since 1980, The Blues Foundation has inducted 350+ performers, industry professionals, recordings and literature into the Blues Hall of Fame. Of the 130 performer inductees, 120 of them are African-American.

1. Motion by KE3VV to accept the minutes of the September 11, 2015 Meeting. Seconded by WB9NUL. The motion passed by a vote of 9 in favor, 0 abstention and 0 opposed.
2. Motion by WQ7A to approve the Treasurer's Reports for August 2015, September 2015, October 2015 and November 2015. Seconded by N1API. The motion passed by a vote of 9 in favor, 1 abstention and 0 opposed.
3. Motion by N1API to approve Awards Manager's Financial Reports for November 2015. Seconded by WB9NUL. The motion passed by a vote of 9 in favor, 1 abstention, and 0 opposed.

Old Business

4. Report on the Status of MARAC nets. (N5MLP)
5. Board approval of change in date of 2016 Convention and venue. (W4SIG)

Motion by W4SIG to approve the change of the date and location of the 2016 MARAC Convention to August 1-4 at the Hyatt Place hotel in Germantown, TN. Seconded by WB9NUL.

The motion passed by a vote of 10 in favor, 0 abstention and 0 opposed.

New Business

6. Motion by NF0N for MARAC to sponsor 2016 MARAC County Hunter CW and SSB contests, that a Greg (NM2L) be appointed Contest Coordinator, and that a Contest Menu option be added at marac.org. Seconded by W4SIG.

The motion passed by a vote of 10 in favor, 0 abstention and 0 opposed.

7. Motion by N0KV to appoint a committee consisting of W8JJ, N0KV, and W4SIG to investigate, negotiate with, and recommend to the Board a third-party election administration company to conduct and certify the validity of MARAC Board Member/Officer and bylaw changes referendums beginning with the 2016 MARAC elections being held in May 2016. Seconded by W4SIG.

The motion passed by a vote of 9 in favor, 0 abstention and 1 opposed.

8. Motion by W4SIG to change section 1.3 (c) of the MARAC Bylaws regarding scheduling of meeting of directors to specify a time frame within which the MARAC President must call a special meeting if any combination of five Directors or Officers request such a meeting and to clarify who may call for the meeting. (Recommended changes are highlighted in red).

1.3(c) The President or **any combination of five (5) Directors and Officers** may call special meetings of the Board of Directors at any time. The President shall set a date and time for the special meeting and shall notify the Secretary for the purpose of giving notice of the meeting to all directors. **The meeting date must be within 30 days after the President receives the request for the special meeting. If the President fails to set the meeting date within the 30-day period, any combination of five directors and officers may set the date and time for the Special Meeting and notify the Secretary for the purpose of giving notice of the meeting to all directors.**

Seconded by W8JJ. The motion passed by a vote of 7 in favor, 0 abstention and 3 opposed.

9. Motion by W0NAC to clarify Section 4.1(e) of the MARAC Bylaws regarding MARAC Family Membership to add specific language requiring that Family Members must hold an amateur radio license.

4.1(e) Family Members: Any **amateur radio licensee** related to a Regular member who resides at the same address as the Regular member may become a Family Member of MARAC upon application. Family members do not pay dues, but continued membership shall be based on current payment of dues by the Regular member with whom they reside. Family members are entitled to vote and hold office, but shall not be entitled to receive a separate copy of the MARAC newsletter.

Seconded by W8JJ The motion passed by a vote of 10 in favor, 0 abstention, and 0 opposed.

Report of the Awards Committee

10. Motion by KC6AWX to modify the award rules for County Hunter of the Year by adding the word “consideration” and a 5th paragraph to the award rule, as follows:

Criteria for **consideration** for nomination for County Hunter of the Year include the following:

1. Quality and quantity of operating to provide Valid Contacts from multiple counties while in Mobile Operation or while assisting mobile county hunters as a Net Control Station (NCS) or assistant NCS.
2. Participation in MARAC activities and service to MARAC and the members of MARAC.
3. Other activities in support of county hunting.
4. Technical proficiency in design or usage or implementation of enhancements to mobile operation or county hunting net operations. Overall amateur radio general support in a manner consistent with good operation and advancement of the hobby.
5. **Current MARAC officers and directors are not eligible for this award.**

Seconded by W4SIG. The motion passed by a vote of 10 in favor, 0 abstention and 0 opposed.

11. Motion by KC6AWX to modify and clarify the award rules for Ran All (State) Counties Award, as follows:

Ran All (State) (USA) Counties Award

OBJECTIVE: To make contacts with amateur radio operators while transmitting from every county in a State **or all States (all USA Counties)**.

SPECIAL RULES: The applicant must make **Valid Contacts** while transmitting from every county in a State **(or all USA Counties)** while the applicant is in a **Mobile Operation** or **Portable Operation**. **The counties required for each State award and the All USA Counties award are determined by the official list of USA Counties on the date of the application for an award. If the official counties list for State has changed after the applicant has already received a State award for that State, the revised list as of the date of application will be the list required for the All USA Counties award. However, if only the name of a county has changed and the boundaries of the county have not changed, credit for transmitting from that county survives and applies to the current name as well as the previous name.**

AWARD LEVELS: A separate State award is available for each State. All counties in a State must be completed for the award for that State. Each award may be earned multiple times up to a maximum of ten (10) times, but only the first time is a numbered award. An applicant must complete transmitting from all counties in a State **(or all USA Counties)** before starting over **for that State (or All USA Counties)**.

APPLICATION AND FEES: Standard application. There is no fee for award certificates for MARAC members. For non-members, there is no fee for the first award certificate for each State. The fee for each additional award certificate for a State is \$3 for non-members. The fee for the optional mobile plaque for each State is \$20. A trophy will be awarded for completing **All USA Counties**. There is no fee for the trophy.

Seconded by KZ2P. The motion passed by a vote of 10 in favor, 0 abstention and 0 opposed.

12. Motion by KC6AWX to modify and clarify the award rules for the Double Diamond Award, as follows:

Double Diamond Award

OBJECTIVE: To make **Valid Contacts** in **All USA Counties** with other **mobile** operators who have earned the MARAC Mobile Diamond Award, including contacts while in a **Mobile Operation** transmitting from at least 500 counties as the holder of the Mobile Diamond Award.

SPECIAL RULES: All **Valid Contacts** for this award must have been made on or after September 15, 2015, and after the applicant has received the Mobile Diamond Award.

After having received the Mobile Diamond Award, the applicant must make contacts **with other holders of the Mobile Diamond Award in All USA Counties (Double Diamond contacts)**. Both Mobile Diamond holder operators **involved in each Double Diamond contact** may count both counties toward the Double Diamond Award. These contacts may be any combination of mobile to mobile, mobile to fixed or fixed to fixed stations.

The applicant must **also** make **Valid Contacts** while transmitting in a **Mobile Operation** from at least five hundred (500) different counties.

In each of the 500 different counties transmitted while in **Mobile Operation**, the applicant must use at least (2) different **Bands** and make at least three (3) Valid Contacts with different stations on

any one **Band** and a total of three (3) or more additional **Valid Contacts** on one or more additional **Bands (any combination of additional Bands)**. At least one of these mobile contacts must be with another holder of the Mobile Diamond Award and that contact may be on any **Band**. **If needed, this mobile contact may also count toward the requirement to make Valid Contacts with other Mobile Diamond holders in All USA Counties.**

For each **Valid Contact**, the two Mobile Diamond Award holders must be in separate counties (or countries) at the time the **Valid Contact** is made.

AWARD LEVELS: **There are no intermediate levels for this award. The award is for making Double Diamond contacts in All USA Counties, as well as transmitting from 500 counties in a Mobile Operation.**

APPLICATION AND FEES: Standard application and logs. There are no fees for MARAC members for this award. Standard fees apply to non-members.

Seconded by WQ7A. The motion passed by a vote of 10 in favor, 0 abstention and 0 opposed.

13. Motion by N1API to authorize the Treasurer to reimburse the Convention Chairman up to \$2,000.00 for major convention prizes for each Annual Convention, if needed, in addition to the convention seed money. Seconded by N0KV.

The motion passed by a vote of 9 in favor, 0 abstention and 1 opposed.

14. Being no further business to discuss, motion by N1API to adjourn the meeting at 0104Z. Seconded by N0KV. The meeting was adjourned by a vote of 10 in favor and 0 opposed.
